pring has come and gone and, with the chang-Ding seasons, our priorities shift. So many people ask us how the dogs handle the bitter cold of Texas in February, but we worry more about the dogs during June, July and August. The dogs like the cold; but we do see some of them struggle during the heat of summer, especially our older dogs. Most of our seniors – especially those who have a hard time with extreme weather conditions - are kept in climate-controlled buildings. For the dogs who live outdoors, each has their very own shade canopy, as well as large trees that offer natural shade. Waters are changed every day, and topped off in the evening by the employees who live on site, so that all dogs have clean, cool water to drink at all times.

With the warmer temperatures, come all the bugs. You know what we're talking about. Fleas, ticks, the dreaded mosquito. Each dog is given a monthly heartworm, flea and tick prevention pill. If you don't know, heartworms are transmitted through mosquitoes. Heartworm prevention is a must, especially in the South where mosquitoes take over during the summer. If you would like to contribute to help with the cost of our monthly prevention, you can set up a recurring donation through our website. \$20 a month will cover the cost of heartworm, flea, and tick prevention for one dog.

We are pleased to report . . . all dogs remain safe and happy.

We would like to thank all of you who checked on us during storm season. It can be a scary time with thunderstorms, lightning, and heavy WIND!

We have been fortunate, over the years that we have never been hit by a tornado (knock on wood); however, a severe thunderstorm with wind gusts of 50 MPH or more can be terrifying when you are caring for so many live animals, and the property that houses them. The employees who live on site remain diligent in watching the weather, patrolling the property during storms to make sure the dogs are safe, giving out sedatives to the dogs who suffer from storm anxiety; the list of things our employees do for the dogs is endless. We are pleased to report, there has been no damage to the property, and all dogs remain safe and happy.

NEWCOMERS

The term "dumped" is sort of an ugly word, no matter how you use it. However, it seems appropriate to use when someone "dumps" a dog (or two) at our facility, because that is precisely what they are doing; dumping dogs like they would their trash.


These two were dumped outside our adoption center; we do not know how long they had been sitting in the wire kennel, but they were excited to see us when we arrived to work in the morning. When we say we are over capacity, we mean it, so taking in two adult dogs really puts us in a bind, especially when we aren't expecting them.

We had to make several moves to open up a space for two young, active dogs, but we did it. Meet the newest members of the ARFhouse

family: Thelma & Louise. Thelma & Louise have been spayed, vaccinated, tested for heartworms and treated for intestinal worms. They are currently available for adoption and you can expect to be seeing them at our upcoming PETsMART adoption events.

FEATURED PET —

We had a person reach out to us about a pregnant dog who had wandered onto their property and given birth to 12 puppies beneath their home. Sadly, 3 puppies did not make it, likely due to extreme heat. I don't think anyone is ever prepared in that situation so they called ARF.

Dealing with a momma dog and her puppies can be tricky, especially when the puppies are just two days old. We knew

they could not be kept in an outdoor area, it's just too hot for such young pups; so we made a quiet place for both mom and puppies in our Hope House; a climate controlled building with two separate indoor kennels, perfect for a nursing mother.

Upon arrival, momma (now Casper) was none too thrilled with our presence around her puppies; she acted aggressively, but we are used to protective mothers so we gave her space to gain trust so that we would be able to handle her and the babies. It's been a slow process, gaining her trust, but every day we make progress and we believe her behavior is driven by fear and protection, not aggression.

We hope to be able to transport the puppies to our partner rescue in Colorado; but with overcrowding across the country, that's no guarantee. For the time being, Casper and her puppies are safe and cool, with full bellies. We are pleased to report all puppies that were brought to us are thriving and this will be Casper's last litter.



If you keep up with other rescue groups, you already know adoptions are basically non-existent. It seems no one is adopting dogs right now. We face a real problem in this country, but more especially here in the South. Overpopulation is overwhelming us due to the simple fact, so many people do not have their dogs spayed or neutered. The calls to take strays will always overwhelm us; but it seems 80% of the calls we are getting right

now, are people wanting to surrender their pets. This is a discouraging realization, but we continue to put in the work to get our dogs placed in loving, forever homes. We have had just 6 adoptions this year, where typically we would have 30-40 by this time.

They're thriving in their little house. I am their caregiver, cleaning their litter box 2 x's a day, and giving them their dry food, plus a little can split between the two in the evening. They are so affectionate I can barely get the door shut when I leave them. We will have all medical needs performed and are confident each will find their place with cat lovers. Anyone out there?

We try to keep our communications lighthearted; in a business that can be so depressing at times, we like to touch on reality, while maintaining a positive outlook. The fact is, we are in crisis. I don't mean we are at risk of closing the doors; our reality is that all rescues are currently in crisis. With over 300 dogs to care for, payroll is our primary expense. But naturally, being a facility spread out over 20+ acres, with two kennel buildings, an adoption center, housing for four employees, utility vehicles, two vans, thousands of feet of chain link fencing, and a 2400 square foot barn, our maintenance costs are exorbitant.

Last, but not least, feed and veterinary expenses for these dogs. We shared in our last newsletter that, for the first time in years, we have had to purchase our own food. This is attributed to the crisis we talked about. Resources are drying up, but the animals need to be fed.

We ask that if you have anything to spare, no matter the amount, please consider giving it to the 300+ abandoned and abused dogs of North Texas who call ARFhouse home. With your help, we can continue to be their bridge to a new life.

ARFhouse is more than a dog sanctuary. I'm sure I've included a picture of our mammoth donkeys in the past....but this will be of interest to our new supporters. Fiona is the dark donkey and her "daughter" is the lighter colored one. They each weigh approximately 1600 lbs. Fiona was in a terrible place with no feed and little water, living in a small pen. The owner agreed to let us have her. We didn't realize she had been bred, and a month later Pippa was born. We had a 3-side barn built for them and they took up residence in a large pasture with our two senior shetland ponies (who already had a shelter). They have a wonderful life here at ARFhouse and keep to themselves. I wouldn't say they are friendly; but they tolerate us humans since we always have a treat or feed for them to supplement the grass. They're smart and fascinating animals.


