LIFE AT THE SANCTUARY with newcomers, rescues, adoptions and more!

So many of you have checked on us during storm season; we thank you for that! Somehow, we have managed to go unscathed (knock on wood). While storm season in Texas can be a little scary at times, with severe thunderstorms, high winds, tornado warnings, we are so thankful to report that there has been no major damage to the facility and that all dogs are safe and happy! We have a system in place for when severe weather hits, and we would like to thank Dawn Herndon – who lives on-site – for being diligent in her efforts to keep our dogs safe during such events.

Adoptions are slow, TOO slow! Alarmingly slow, in fact. Last year at this time, we had over thirty adoptions; this year, we've had twelve. We believe there are a number of factors causing the decrease in adoptions, but the fact is, it doesn't matter WHY, it only matters that it's true. Adoptions are down across the board; talk to any rescue and they'll tell you the same thing: people just aren't adopting right now. This presents a problem for us when the number of calls to take dogs has done nothing but increase. You can help with this. If you know of anyone who is looking to add a companion to their family, send them our way! We have so many adoptable dogs, many of whom aren't currently on our website for one reason or another. Believe me when I say: if someone is looking for a dog, chances are we have one that's just the right fit!

Out of consideration for the animal lovers and supporters whose help we depend upon, we attempt to make our newsletters upbeat and positive. We do not want to focus on the negative; instead, we try to focus on the possibilities for newcomers as well as the joy of adoptees and their new families. But we face challenges every single day, some of them almost unbelievable, These precious newcomers deserve the right to have their story told. NEWCOMERS . . .




NEWCOMERS CONTINUED...





We have never subscribed to the idea that alarming you, our friends, was a positive approach to asking for support. We do NOT want our friends/supporters to think we are locking the doors. We are NOT. But at this time, I feel that we must make you aware of the crisis that is affecting all rescues and ask for you to rally with us during these difficult times. We are seeing it all across the board and I'm sure you are as well if you follow other rescue groups: adoptions are down, donations are down; however, the calls to take animals are at an all-time high. We are overwhelmed.

We are not insensitive to the current economic climate; we are aware that with the ever-rising cost of living, the first cutback people are making is charity. We get it. Our costs have skyrocketed, so we understand the position everyone is in. We have noticed that around 1/3 of our \$20 monthly donations have been cancelled; cutbacks. While \$20 might not seem like a lot to some people, they add up, and it hurts us.

We are currently working in "the red" for the year; something that has never happened in the past. Donations have not been half as much as in past years. We were unable to host the golf tournament this year, and that had an impact on our income. We have 13 employees on payroll who care for and attend to the needs of 325 dogs. Our vet costs average \$5000 per month. This figure includes the people in our community who need to have their animals spayed or neutered but are unable to do so because of the cost. We do NOT want to suspend this outreach to the population in our immediate area. We are depending on North Texas Giving Day this year to make up for lost income. We need your help. I want to assure you we do have investments, but this money has always been for a rainy day, a nest egg we never intended to have to dip into. Naturally, our investments were created with the idea that they would generate more, not be used for operations. The fact that we are even having to entertain this thought is worrisome.

We come to you once again to ask for your continued support, and to urge you, if you have anything extra to give, please give it to the dogs. Share our cause with your friends; help spread our mission. We cannot continue this mission without you, so please remember AR-Fhouse and the good work we do to change the world for the dogs that come to us in need.

Bernie's Battle

There are some days we feel like giving up; the day-today grind is enough to make anyone break. Seeing the things we have seen, seeing the dogs come to us in the most horrific conditions; it would be easy for us to give up. Then we walk in and see these faces, and it all makes sense again.

Bernie is one of those faces. A man showed up one late afternoon with a dog in his vehicle; the dog had stumbled up to his barn and it was clear just by looking at him that he had been struck by a car. It is truly a wonder how Bernie made it as far as he did in the shape he was in; his back leg bone was protruding through his skin and his eye was severely damaged; you couldn't even tell he had an eye there. Any person with half a heart would have helped, but you'd be surprised; luckily for Bernie, this man has one.



It was after-hours at our veterinary clinic when the man arrived, but we knew this poor dog would not make it through the night. We gently lifted

Bernie out of the man's vehicle, and placed him into our van, where he was then rushed to an open clinic in Pilot Point. Roxanne South was the one to take him and there were moments she wasn't sure he'd make the trip.

After the initial examination, emergency surgery on his broken leg, and a few nights at the vet, Bernie was able to come home. We made a space available in our senior/special needs building for Bernie to recover; we knew it would be a long journey to recovery for this sweet boy, and we needed to make him as comfortable as possible.

Bernie lost his leg, and his eye, but he never lost his spirit. You would think after such a traumatic experience, he would be shut down and we would not only have to heal his body, we would also have to heal his heart; but this boy has shown us such love, tenacity, SPUNK!

Dogs like Bernie are what keep us going, even on the hard days. To see a dog come in and not be sure they were going to make it, to watching them fly in and out of the doggie-door is our "why". Why we continue to do what we do. We are so proud to be able to tell you that Bernie didn't only recover from his injuries, he is now thriving at ARFhouse! The sweetest boy with the most adorable zest for life, our Bernie.

NADIYA RESCUE!

We received an urgent call from a longtime friend and supporter; she had stopped on the side of a busy highway near Sadler after seeing an injured dog lying in a ditch. When she attempted to pick up the dog to place it into her vehicle, the dog

snapped.

This happens when a dog is in distress, and it is no indication that the dog would act aggressively under normal circumstances. So, she did what anyone would do; she called for help. We are always cautious when sending our team on a rescue where an injured dog is involved; there are so many factors, and it can quickly turn into a dangerous situation. Nevertheless, we were not going to let an injured dog lie on the side of the road.

Our employees, Roxanne South and Tasha Humphrey loaded the van with a catch pole and crate and headed out on a mission. We do NOT like using a catch pole; however, in the interest of keeping our employees safe, sometimes it's necessary. After arriving at the scene and assessing the situation, Roxanne and Tasha decided it would be necessary, given the circumstances, to use the pole. They were able to get the dog out of the ditch where she was lying in water, and safely place her into the crate. Obviously, their next stop was to our veterinary clinic. The doctor and staff at our clinic are wonderful and always make themselves available for our emergency cases.

After the initial examination, it appears the road to recovery will be a long one. X-rays show a fractured pelvis near the ball-joint. We have decided to name her Nadiya, which means "Hope". Nadiya is currently at ARFhouse in one of our senior/special needs buildings where she will rest and recover from her trauma before we proceed with the proper treatment plan. We have been vocal about the overwhelming number of calls to take dogs; whether they are strays, pets, or abandoned dogs. Unfortunately, we just cannot take them all; however, our hands were tied, and we knew we had to step in. This is what we do. We are here for dogs like Nadiya and sometimes, we simply cannot say "no".

We will continue to post updates about Nadiya on our social media and will include a story in our next newsletter to let you know her progress.
